2018-2019 FAFSA CHANGES: IRS TAX DATA AND SECURING PERSONAL INFORMATION

For financial aid administrators, verifying tax data can be a tedious process. Modifications to the 2018-2019 FAFSA should be a welcome change.

IRS Data Retrieval Tool (DRT)

First and probably the most important, is the return of the IRS Data Retrieval Tool (DRT) for families to potentially download their income information directly into the FAFSA. The DRT functionality had suffered a seven-month hiatus. A big change as opposed to years past with the DRT, is the tax data will no longer be visible to the person completing



the FAFSA. The figures will be encrypted which is one more crucial step to helping prevent identity theft. Potential hackers can no longer simply create an account with known personal identifiers of an unsuspecting user and grab the income data displayed on the screen.

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Another new feature, after logging in for the first time, the user will be presented a screen in which they must accept terms of agreement with the legal ramifications explained for those



attempting to access a file that does not belong to them. "Any access in furtherance of any criminal or tortious act in violation of the Constitution or laws of the United States or any State. If system monitoring reveals information indicating possible criminal activity, such evidence may be provided to law enforcement personnel."

Keep 2016 W-2s and 1099s Handy

A good tip for those families completing this year's FAFSA is to have their W-2s and 1099s handy from 2016 because while a large majority of the data is going to transfer in from the federal tax return, the family is still required to answer questions about wages and retirement account contributions. Also, if there was a roll-over transaction in the tax year, the family will be required to answer questions regarding whether the full amount was rolled over or not.

Request Tax Transcripts Via Phone, Fax or Mail

For those that have issues or flat out refuse to use the IRS data retrieval tool, they may have difficulty requesting the 2016 tax transcript online if the school asks for it. Because the IRS has had issues with identity theft in the past, the IRS has been hesitant to offer up the online service once again to new users. Families will need to request tax transcripts via the 4506-T form which can be faxed/mailed or by calling the IRS directly, until this service is offered again.

Added Level of Security

Finally, another level of security added this year is that the FAFSA user will get a letter mailed to them, letting them know that their tax data was utilized to complete the form, in case there may be identify theft involved. The FAFSA process continues to improve each year and the federal government has taken some key steps to ensure personal data is kept more secure.

For verification purposes, financial aid administrators will be happiest to see the DRT service is available once again, leading to less required collection of tax documents at the school level. FEDERAL EDUCATION Division May Be Shrinking

The largest division of the Department of Education may soon no longer hold



that title if some of the workers there accept an employment proposition extended to them. Some of the Office of Federal Student Aid's (OFSA) 1300 employees have been offered buyouts, although the exact amount of potential employees impacted has yet to be made clear. The packages extended include early retirement as well as voluntary leave. Labeled as a "separation incentive", the amounts include a lump sum payment up to \$25,000 that is subject to taxes. Employees who accept the offer cannot work for the federal government again for five years or they would be required to pay back the buyout that was received.

OFSA is responsible for many aspects that education professionals such as college financial aid administrators and auditors utilize to function in their daily roles. Areas the branch oversees include the Information for Financial Aid Professional (IFAP) website along with student-centric sites like the federal landing page for Direct Loans. With less help available within the division, some industry watchdogs worry that certain aspects that OFSA oversees could suffer in the long run due to the lack of employee resources.

The Trump administration signed an executive order in March that included eliminating certain aspects of federal agencies that were deemed unnecessary as a cost saving measure. "Within 180 days of the date of this order, the head of each agency shall submit to the Director a proposed plan to reorganize the agency, if appropriate, in order to improve the efficiency, effectiveness, and accountability of that agency." Time will tell how many federal ED employees within OFSA accept the offer and how that will impact college financial aid offices.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE Watch: Removing Barriers for Homeless Students

A new amendment to the Higher Education Authorization Act was introduced in September with bi-partisan support from multiple Senators to help combat homelessness for college students. The amendment would help provide housing options for students in between terms, and improve outreach to homeless students.

Senator Rob Portman of Ohio helped create The Higher Education Access and Success for Homeless and Foster Youth Act. Mr. Portman states, "kids in foster care face an uphill battle when they pursue higher education. It is in all of our interests to help these kids who have aged out of the foster-care system or have experienced homelessness, and ensure that services for them are a priority in existing federal programs. This common-sense legislation will remove unnecessary barriers and make college more affordable for these youth."

A study surveyed tens of thousands of community college students across the country and found that about 14 percent of them were homeless and about half were housing insecure, which meant that they had missed rent payments or slept at a friend's house. By easing the verification and determination process for those who are unaccompanied by an adult, the Act removes barriers and makes going to college more practical for homeless and foster children. It clarifies that youth under the age of twenty-four who are determined to be unaccompanied or homeless are considered to be independent students, allowing them to receive the full financial aid package that they need.
